# 20mph Survey Results

Bampton Parish Council 8<sup>th</sup> March 2022

#### Summary

A consultation with residents of Bampton began on 31 January 2022 and was closed on 28 February 2022. The following methods were used to consult as widely as possible:

- 1. An online survey was promoted and shared on Facebook on the Bampton Parish Council page and shared to Bampton-in-the-Bush and Memories of Bampton groups.
- 2. Posters were placed on noticeboards around the village with the website URL of the online survey, QR code for quick access from smartphones and postal address details for offline responses.


Copies of the Facebook post and poster are given in Appendix A.

The following number of responses were received:

Offline survey responses received by the clerk	27	

In the public online survey a number of duplicate responses were found from the same IP address, and 156 were therefore voided. The full details are given in Appendix B. This left 254 valid responses that responded as shown below. Over 50% of respondents also left a comment in support of their response, these are listed in Appendix C.

### Appendix B - Duplicate IP Address Responses

In the public online survey responses a number of duplicate responses were found from the same IP address. In order for survey respondents to remain anonymous it is impossible to identify multiple responses from the same individual but the IP address gives some indication where this may have taken place. Responses from duplicate IP addresses were as follows:

A decision was made by the IT Committee to count up to two responses per IP address to allow for the possibility of two adults responding in the same household. This was recognised as not being a perfect model but in the absence of any data identifying individuals a compromise was needed. The vast majority of responses appeared valid with only one IP address appearing to have significantly abused the survey.

This means that the number of voided responses was 156, leaving 254 valid responses.
